

Essenhaus

The history of the Essenhaus is a story of growth, commitment, and genuine hospitality. In 1970, Bob and Sue Miller moved west from Sugarcreek, Ohio to Middlebury, Indiana. After arriving, they purchased property on U.S. 20. The property contained a small 24-hour truck stop known as Everett's Highway Inn. After a week of minor repairs and cleaning, they reopened January 4, 1971, as an Amish-style restaurant complete with Amish and Mennonite cooks and waitstaff. Das Dutchman Essenhaus was rich in Christian values. They made the restaurant into a smoke-free, 120-seat diner, closed on Sundays so their employees had a day of rest, time for worship, and family fellowship. Today, Bob and Sue's children maintain the daily operations of the now world-renowned, largest family owned restaurant in Indiana.



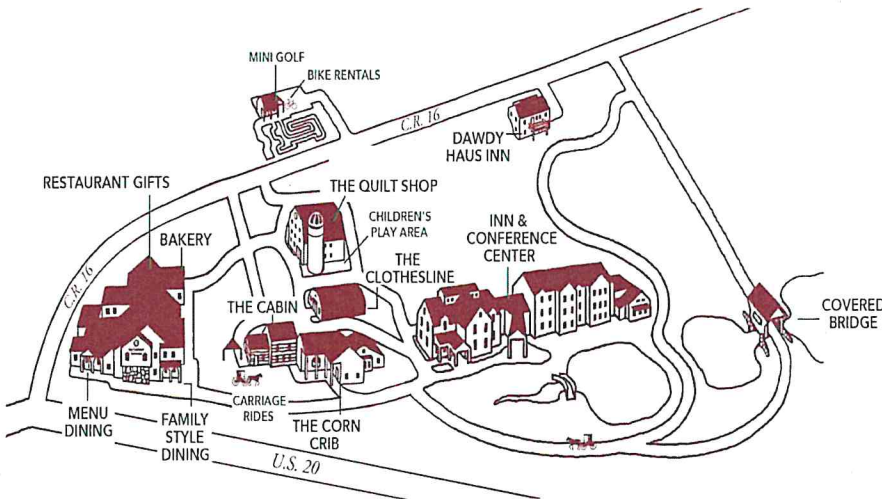
